converged just outside Baton Rouge at the lovely, quaint and extremely hospitable St Francisville Hotel on the Lake, over the Veterans Day weekend, November 7-10, 1996, to talk a lot, eat a lot, laugh a lot, and cry a lot in honor and commemoration of the men from their respective units, who served their country and were killed in battle and also for those who carry those battles around with them to this day.

This was the motto first uttered by Chuck Boyle and adopted by the group as the *theme* for the weekend. People came from the four corners of the United States. There were folks from Alabama. Arkansas, California, Colorado, Florida. Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Massachusetts. Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey. Oregon, Tennessee, Texas. Washington, Wisconsin and, of course, Louisiana. These men and women had just one compelling reason to be in St Francisville, to share with, and show they care for, others who have been there.

Awb Norris reviews the troops

At 14.00 hours on Friday, November 8, 1996, under a beautiful blue fall sky in Clinton. Louisiana, approximately 225 Clinton High School JROTC Cadets staged. "The Parade That Never Was" for the Vietnam Veterans, their wives, friends—and guests—Six extraordinary companies of Cadets, obviously due to the superb tutoring of Major Chuck

Boyle, First Sergeant Elisah Boyd Jr and Sergeant Major Charles R Duplechain and under the command leadership of Cadet/Major Vanessa Williams, Battalion Commander, performed so admirably, that they, as we would have said 28 years ago, "superbly strutted their stuff."

And their stuff was something exciting to see! Closing one's eyes, listening to the battalion commander, company commanders and platoon leaders "barking" out orders, one could almost feel they were back at Benning, Polk, Bragg or any one of the other basic training facilities through out this country. For a fleeting moment in time.......... I was 18 years old again.

Colonel Awb Norris (Ret), the former Battalion Commander of the 2Bn/22nd Infantry in Vietnam from September 1967 to early March 1968, reviewed the JROTC Battalion passing as Companies on Line, Platoons on Line, and *selected Delta Company as best Company*. This was the "Honors Review", typical of the traditional "Blue Day" review done at Fort—Benning's Officers—Candidate School.

Earlier in the day

The Veterans and guests first gathered at 10:00 hours in the school auditorium for a display of patriotism, quite unlike what we have come to expect in schools in this day and age. We were welcomed by Major Williams and Major Boyle, then the invocation was held. The JROTC Color Guard posted the colors and we

Bill Allison's fantastic slide presentation

Saturday. November 9, 1996 dawned with excitement and anticipation for this morning at 10 AM all who wished would be entertained with the most amazing and memorable visual and audio tribute to the fighting soldiers who served in Vietnam I first was privileged to witnessed this presentation given by Bill Allison in Kissimmee, Florida in April 1996 in a small room with a handful of people, then again in Kissimmee with a roomful of people, then twice in St Francisville. I must say that each time Bill's illustration was presented differently. although each time he covered all of the same items and details. As Bill spoke, his emotions and memories took over and we were transported back in time into the bamboo jungle, sweating, hot and tired, fearing again for our lives. As we envisioned the area at Fire Support Base Burt (aka Suoi Cut) and reminisced about that night, all of the emotions that one could feel were instantaneously brought back. I observed that even folks who were not at Burt, were almost able to live the experience that those of us who were there, were doing, once again. Bill's ability to weave and inject men into the action. presenting their first hand accounts as to where they were and what they did, made the night itself seemed to be relived. We could almost feel the ground vibrate with the B-52 strikes, smell the trees and foliage burning with the Napalm and feel the exhaustion and rage the next morning.

Leaders - Real Men

It is not hard to see why men like Awb Norris. Bill Allison, Gordon Kelley and Chuck Boyle and so many others are respected and loved by the men who served under, but with them. *They brought most of us back alive*. It would be unrealistic for anyone to think that a leader could bring everyone back home, but the true test and mark of a superior leader, is the decisions and sacrifices he knows *he must make* and *those he will not make*.

For All Chargin' Charlie - Triple Deucer's Out There

Since April 1996. I have been compiling a database of men who served with C 2/22 anytime from 1966 when the men went over on the ship until 1971 when C 2/22 came home. I was fortunate to get help from various sources, namely Brad Hull, a tireless locator, who served with A 2/22 and who is responsible for "Finding Me" from Bill Allison, Company Commander from 9/67 off and on until 5/68, who supplied me with three (3) original rosters from Nam, from Awb Norris, former Battalion Commander of 2/22 from 9/67 to early 3/68, and secretary of the 22nd IRS, from Ben Meyers. an advisor who served 3-4 years in Nam, and who gave me over 1000 potential addresses to try to find people, from Dave Schill, a Navy Seabee, who has

been a "brother" to C 3/22 and C 2/22. and from men, just like yourselves, who have remembered someone's name or address and supplied it to me. There are over 275 names on my list, although I do not have addresses for all of these. The list is eleven pages long and if you wish a copy, to try to locate a friend or buddy, or to look and see who I don't have, just send me \$1.00 to cover cost of copying and postage and I'll be glad to send it Also if you have any information about men's whereabouts or about KIA's. please get in touch with me. Additionally, if you'd like to write any stories, I'd be glad to publish them in future newsletters. Our aim is to locate as many C 2/22 men as possible and have one huge reunion as soon as possible.
